\$3 million

donated to the South Australian community

The Employee Foundation reached a significant milestone this year in donating our 3 millionth dollar (and counting!) to the South Australian community.

The Foundation was established back in 2006, with the aim of enabling SA Power Networks and Enerven employees, their families and friends, to make a positive contribution to our State.

This is achieved through volunteering, donation of goods, fundraising activities, and a strong payroll donation program.

Now, 13 years on, the Foundation has continued to go from strength to strength, with no sign of slowing down.

Since its inception, the Foundation has donated to more than 70 charities across South Australia.

Reaching \$3 million in donations is a testament to the hard work, big-heartedness and positive spirit of everyone involved in the Foundation.

General Manager People & Culture and Chair of the Employee Foundation, David Syme, believes the success of the program stems from the charitable culture of the business. "The Foundation is raising \$500,000 every year, with one in three employees donating every week from their pay," said David.

"We really are making a difference and what it honestly comes down to is the generosity and giving spirit of our employees."

Employee Foundation Executive Officer, Vicki Shearer, is blown away by this incredible achievement.

"We have such wonderful staff from around the business who are constantly raising money, donating goods and volunteering to help better the community," said Vicki.

"But it's not just the employees - it's their families and friends who are also out there helping us cook BBQs, renovate rooms, plant trees and pack backpacks with essential goods for kids in need.

"We could not have reached this momentous milestone without everyone's continuous support over the last 13 years, so thank you."

Blind book sale

Mike Lucas, from Property Services, has organised half a dozen Workplace Initiatives over the past few years with his most recent being the sale of new books to staff at highly discounted prices. All of the funds raised from Mike's book sale went towards supporting the Royal Society for the Blind (RSB). In January, Mike and members of the Employee Foundation Management Committee welcomed both two and four legged visitors from RSB to accept a cheque for his most recent efforts. Mike's continuous work over the years has resulted in donations of over \$7,500 to the South Australian community.





OzHarvest is Australia's leading food rescue charity. Our volunteers have been helping the OzHarvest food rescue van since 2016. We join the regular van driver to rescue surplus food and re-distribute it to people in need, and therefore divert food waste from landfill.

New Committee takes the reins

Representatives of the Employee Foundation Management Committee are appointed following elections for a two-year term. The latest elections were held late in 2018 and the new Committee (seven of the eight representatives were new) commenced in January 2019. A quick and steep learning curve was surmounted, and they were thrown straight into the deep end. Glenelg Surf Life Saving Club fundraising

Michael Robran, from Network Management, wanted to support the Glenelg Surf Life Saving Club (GSLSC) after he was saved from drowning and a permanent injury, following an accident off the Glenelg Jetty. Michael organised a Workplace Initiative raising funds online and hosted a BBQ at Keswick. Michael's efforts resulted in a cheque for \$13,200, which was handed over to GSLSC in front of staff, volunteers and Nippers. The GSLSC has put the funds towards the purchase of an Inflatable Rescue Boat (IRB).



Hutt St Centre volunteering and Angel for a Day


A fundraising initiative of the Hutt St Centre, 'Angel for a Day', provides daily breakfast and lunch to 200 people experiencing homelessness in Adelaide. The Employee Foundation donated \$5,000 to this initiative, funding the running of the Hutt St Centre kitchen for a whole month, making us 'Archangels'! Our volunteers help serve breakfast at the Hutt St Centre every Tuesday morning and have been doing this for 13 years. Some of the volunteers have been on our Hutt St Breakfast roster for the whole 13 years - an amazing effort.

Raising funds for homeless kittens

Since 2017 Melissa Rasche, Business Support Officer at Angle Park warehouse, has been tempting staff and visitors with chocolates, soft drinks, ice creams and lollies to raise money for her favourite animal rescue charities. In 2019 a massive \$5,100 was donated to the Cat Adoption Foundation as a result of Melissa's fantastic fundraising efforts. The Cat Adoption Foundation is run solely by a group of dedicated volunteers without any government funding. To keep adoption fees affordable, the Foundation relies on donations and fundraising, so our donation was very much appreciated.

During 2019, Emily and Jane Jusup also headed up a collection of pet food to be shared between the RSPCA and Animal Welfare League in the lead up to kitten season. They received a very generous response from across our organisation, and our donations were gladly welcomed.





Simple Hatha Yoga

Steven Coy, from Learning and Development, led a series of programs teaching employees simple Hatha Yoga. Steven's desire was to use his yoga instructor skills to combine physical and mental health benefits, community support and connecting people within the business. As a result of this initiative, \$5,700 was donated to several charities chosen by Steven including Still Aware, a foundation dedicated to stillbirth prevention, awareness and support, Cancer Council SA and Backpacks 4 SA Kids.

Just by walking, and raising funds, we helped to charge ahead with cancer research, prevention, advocacy and support services. Nine participants achieved 490 kilometres for the month. Overall, we raised \$3,600 which was gratefully accepted by Cancer Council SA Chief Executive, Lincoln Size, at the Angle Park Pole Yard.



Mercer SuperCycle

The Mercer SuperCycle crew hit their 8th year of long-distance riding and even more challenging fundraising in 2019! The team rode the two or seven day event around country South Australia to raise funds for the Hospital Research Foundation's (HRF) Under Our Roof program, which provides family style accommodation to country cancer patients, preventing families from being torn apart during what is already a very stressful time. The big cheque in 2019 was for \$26,300, bringing the total donations to HRF from us to \$196,800.

Kelli Guy, HR Recruitment Officer, decided to follow in the footsteps of hundreds of thousands of pilgrims and tourists who have walked the full Camino Francés trek, to raise money for Ovarian Cancer Australia.

The trek started in France at Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port, and then crossed over the Pyrenees, through cities such as Pamplona, León and Burgos. It finished 800 kilometres later at Santiago de Compostela and took Kelli approximately five weeks to walk the entire trail.

Kelli walked the trek to honour the memory of her mother who passed away almost ten years ago from ovarian cancer. In total, Kelli's efforts resulted in \$6,700 being donated to Ovarian Cancer Australia to fund support services and education to help early detection.

Perfect weather greeted the riders on a Sunday morning for the annual Jim's Lofty Ride, in memory of Jim McCartney, the previous Executive Officer of the Employee Foundation.

Around 20 SA Power Networks riders cycled 55km, climbing over 1000m from Unley to Crafers, through Carey Gully, Uraidla and up to Mt Lofty.

Organised by Mick Pell and Mark Pritchard, the ride raised money for one Jim's favourite charities, Cancer Council SA and resulted in a donation of \$5,000.

Share the Dignity

The Employee Foundation again undertook a collection of sanitary products and monetary donations for Share the Dignity's 'Dignity Drive'. Previously we had sponsored a #Pinkbox Dignity Vending Machine, which was installed at the Red Cross Centre, in Port Lincoln. An initiative of Share the Dignity, these vending machines provide free sanitary products to women and girls in local communities who can't afford to buy them. 65 Roses Day is the national day of Cystic Fibrosis (CF) awareness. Saibeth Walls from IT proposed selling red roses to support 65 Roses Day which the Employee Foundation took on with great enthusiasm and a fair bit of humour. We spent the day selling roses to staff across the business, which resulted in a total donation of \$1,100 to Cystic Fibrosis SA.

Tree Planting Day

For more than 10 years, our volunteers have participated in the annual tree planting event at Para Woodlands, which aims to restore the natural ecosystem to conserve wildlife. In partnership with Nature Foundation SA and the Department for Environment and Water, we have made a significant difference to the area and this legacy will benefit generations to come.

"Nature Foundation SA is most grateful for the Employee Foundation's contribution over the last 10 years, which has included 247 people volunteering, totaling 1,112 hours and helping to plant 65,350 plants," said Patrick Mentzel, Philanthropy Coordinator, Nature Foundation SA.

In 2019, \$8.500 was donated to Nature Foundation SA so it can continue its work to save, protect and restore South Australia's natural biodiversity.

Backpacks 4 SA Kids volunteering

Throughout the year, our staff took part in numerous volunteering shifts at the Backpacks 4 SA Kids (BP4SAK) warehouse, helping to pack hundreds of backpacks for children in need. Our Executive Management Team also spent a morning at the warehouse sorting clothes, toys and toiletry products ready to go in the backpacks. Staff members also worked with BP4SAK to set up and install an online volunteer check in, part of our ongoing practical support for them.

These backpacks relieve some of the stress and anxiety children face when they are removed from their homes, often in traumatic situations and without the opportunity to take any personal belongings with them.

A Leap of Faith for Kids with Cancer

Staff from across SA Power Networks and Enerven, led by Zoe Smith, decided to 'take a leap of faith' and jump out of an aeroplane to raise money for the Childhood Cancer Association (CCA).

As part of the fundraising efforts a hot cross bun competition was held at Enerven's head office in Hindmarsh, and Elliott the CCA mascot came along to judge the best bun.

The team's efforts resulted in a cheque for \$16,400 to the Childhood Cancer Association, which we presented to CEO, Cath O'Loughlin and Community Relationships Manager, Kate McKeegan, who were overjoyed with Enerven and SA Power Networks' generosity.

Amy said it was a really rewarding experience, especially seeing how generous her team and also complete strangers were.





Farewell to some legends

In 2019, after 42 years of service with SA Power Networks, and many years supporting the Employee Foundation, the 'legend' Steve McDonnell retired. On top of all his other achievements, Steve raised funds and donated to the Foundation through our Workplace Initiative program with the Network Social Club. The results of the Workplace Initiatives coordinated by Steve resulted in donations of \$37,000 shared across eight different charities in SA. Steve was awarded an Employee Foundation Lifetime Achievement Award in 2018.

We also said farewell to two other Foundation champions, Joe Hayden and Ben Kempster. Ben and Joe had run the Sparks in the Park fitness program for six years which resulted in over \$100,000 being donated to the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation. Cycle for Sick Kids

Kayla Cranfield had always wanted to cycle through Tuscany, and even though the cycle itself brought its own challenges - carrying everything on her bike, preparing her body for steep, never-ending inclines, and travelling solo through remote regions in a foreign country - she decided she could push the challenge further and make the trip mean something, for herself and others. The Foundation helped Kayla to create Cycle for Sick Kids to raise money for the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation, helping to ensure that sick kids can get the equipment they need to go home to their families. \$2,600 was donated as a result of Kayla's amazing efforts.

Royal Show car parking

Each September we rent out car parking spaces at our Keswick offices to members of the public over the Royal Show weekends. It's a great volunteering experience as everyone who comes through is happy and there are lots of excited kids. The money raised is shared between the Employee Foundation and Operation Flinders Foundation - helping at risk youth.



Top 8 footy tipping

Once again Kev Connell from Network Management organised the annual Top 8 B4 Round 8 footy tipping competition, with money going to the Childhood Cancer Association. The money raised went towards upgrading accommodation for regional families and their children who are affected by cancer. The Top 8 initiative, combined with payroll donations, resulted in a cheque for \$10,800 being presented to the Childhood Cancer Association.

The Employee Foundation sponsored an assistance dog named Veiko through the Royal Society for the Blind's (RSB) Operation K9 (OPK9) program. The program aims to improve the lives of returned Military Veterans who meet the criteria of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, by matching them with a dog who can recognise their symptoms of anxiety/ stress and prevent or reduce the symptoms. Veiko has an extremely calm demeanour and gentle relaxed pace, making him an obvious choice for the program.

In 2019, Mike Lucas from Property Services also coordinated several fundraisers of his own, resulting in an additional \$1,700 going to RSB.

Today, Uniting SA touches the lives of more than 16,000 people through the delivery of a range of diverse programs across aged care, housing, community welfare, disability, mental health and employment from over 30 locations throughout regional and metropolitan South Australia.

and BBQ for Uniting SA

Each December the Employee Foundation sets up collection points across the business for gifts of toys for children who live in poverty. The toys are delivered to Uniting SA at Port Adelaide to be distributed from "Santa's Workshop" to children, grandchildren and foster children of their clients.

Our volunteers also supply and cook a BBQ lunch with free soft drinks and lollies for the kids when they are coming through to collect their gifts. It's a wonderful opportunity to connect with the people we help directly and to feel their appreciation for our work. Almost half the total toys received by Uniting SA's toy appeal come from our donations.



We had a lot of volunteers come out to the Backpacks 4 SA Kids (BP4SAK) warehouse in December to wrap individual Christmas gifts for children in foster care or domestic violence shelters for Christmas. In 2019, we donated \$17,800 to BP4SAK through Workplace Initiatives (including True Grit, Christmas in July, yoga and more) as well as our payroll donations. We completed three other volunteering shifts throughout the year, with a total of over 200 volunteering hours spent at BP4SAK this year.

During the last Employee Foundation Management Committee meeting for 2019, it was decided to donate all remaining funds for the year to a selection of charities in South Australia. The remaining funds (almost \$100,000) was shared between the charities our employees had elected to support with Workplace Initiatives throughout the year. This meant 33 different charities received an additional \$3,000 in the lead up to Christmas

Foodbank, Australia's largest food relief organisation, struggles at Christmas time with their highest demand for food support and their lowest levels of donations. In conjunction with our toy drive in December we also ran a campaign to collect non-perishable foods for Foodbank. The toys were delivered prior to Christmas and in total we donated 207kg of food which equates to 414 meals that went onto the tables of those in need for Christmas.


